

Marshland High School is committed to ensure that all students reach their full potential. We strive to 'eliminate the gap' so no student is disadvantaged with their life chances. Alongside the students' academic studies, we offer additional support and enrichment opportunities which allow pupil premium students to thrive. Through the government's Pupil Premium grant we are able to offer a wide range of diverse support for each student. In 2017/2018 Marshland High School was allocated £195,183 In the Pupil Premium Grant. The report below identifies where spending has been allocated and the impact has been detailed. A review of the strategy and spending will take place termly at the Governors meetings.

# **Impact of Pupil Premium Spending 2017/2018**

Last academic year GCSE results demonstrate that we are making progress towards 'eliminating the gap'. The gap has closed from -0.41 to -0.07.

We had no LAC students in year 11 in 2017/2018.

#### **Attendance**

The table below demonstrates the difference between year groups over the past two years.

In KS3 PP student attendance is lower than non PP students by approximately 3%. In KS4 year 9 our PP students have a higher attendance percentage than our non PP students. In year 10 and 11 our PP students have a lower attendance than our non PP students by approximately 2%.

PP attendance dropped last academic year in comparison to the previous academic year, apart from year 9 where PP attendance improved.

### Parental Engagement

The table below demonstrates the difference between parental engagement of PP students and Non PP students.

# <u>Homework Club – Attended Regularly (Twice per week)</u>

A high number of our Year 7 students attended homework club and/or lunchtime support regularly. As you would expect over 50% of year attended students attended homework club regularly. Year 11 PP attendance was lower due to most PP students being invited to subject intervention on a regular basis.

#### **Behaviour Consequences**

On average 50% of behaviour sanctions are received by PP students. Compared to Non PP students, PP students are more likely to receive a BC2 (Especially for failed homework) than a BC3 or a BC4.

As a school we have raised our expectations and the behaviour policy has been reviewed.

### **Music Tuition**

PP students are being given the opportunity to learn a musical instrument and funding supports this opportunity. In years 7-9 student uptake is much higher for PP students.

# **Trips and Enrichment Activities**

- 100% of Year 7 PP students attended a team building trip at Sandringham within the first 6 weeks to support with transition to Secondary School.
- 68% of Year 10 PP students attended a careers fayre at Springwood High School.
- 93% of Year 10 PP students attended a College Taster Day at The College of West Anglia.
- 75% of Year 11 PP Students attended a Caythorpe Revision Residential weekend.

PP students received lots of enrichment opportunities throughout last academic year. The uptake was very promising.
