Attendance

In an effort to improve school attendance and communication about absence I would like to clarify the school position regarding attendance

- □ It is important that you ensure that your child attends school regularly and if your child is absent then you must contact the school each day to inform us of the circumstances. If we do not receive an explanation for your child's absence, this will be marked as an unauthorised absence in the register
- □ All medical appointments must be evidenced with a copy of the appointment card/letter. If this is not provided, this will be marked as an unauthorised absence in the register. Non-urgent medical appointments i.e. routine dental/eye tests **SHOULD NOT** be taken in school time
- ☐ Leave of absence during term time **WILL NOT** be authorised unless exceptional circumstances are presented
- □ Punctuality will be monitored as closely as attendance. The school day begins at 8.45am. Children who arrive after this time and before the official close of the register at 9:10am will be marked as late. If a child arrives after 9.10am an unauthorised absence is recorded
- $\ \square$ We will carry out regular attendance checks and advise you if your child's attendance falls below 95% for whatever reason
- □ All students' attendance is monitored regularly by the Education Welfare Service. Our Education Welfare Officer, Mr Gray, meets with the school regularly to discuss and monitor students whose attendance is a cause for concern. Our expected attendance levels are:

Excellent	Good	Requires Improvement	Serious Concern (Education Welfare Referral may be made)
98% - 100%	96% - 97%	91% - 95%	Less than 90%

As an example, a child with 90% attendance misses one half day each week, nearly four weeks every school year, over one half a school year in a school career.

Should your child's attendance/punctuality cause concern, an appointment will be arranged between yourself, the House Leader, the Educational Welfare Officer or Mrs Wildman, the attendance officer. The aim of this meeting will be to resolve any issues regarding your child's attendance/punctuality, to offer support, and to agree the way forward to improve this. Should this not lead to an improvement, then a formal referral to the Education Welfare Service may be made.

Thank you for your continued support and for working with our school to improve attendance.
